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How do the e-credits work?

Once your school has completed its Whole School Audit (WSA), you will have access to up to £500 of e-credits to support your involvement in the GLP. For a detailed description of how these work, please see the [e-credit pages](#) of the website.

What is a CPD session?

Once your school has completed the Whole School Audit and registered with the GLP, you will be able to access up to £500 worth of e-credits. These e-credits can be spent on CPD sessions from a range of local and national providers.

CPD providers will offer courses and training to support schools in developing their global learning. We recommend that you consider the results of your Whole School Audit, your School Action Plan and the advice of your Expert Centre and Local Advisor when choosing which CPD offers to spend your e-credits on.

There will be a variety of CPD offers available, ranging from inset days to workshops to online training. All of the CPD sessions support the GLP Whole School Framework and include a balance of content covering global values, skills and global development knowledge so you will be able to choose the most appropriate content and format to match your school's needs.

What can e-credits be spent on?

E-credits are redeemable against the cost of professional development courses on the [GLP Calendar](#) that have been approved for use with the GLP. This means that they will support the aims of the GLP and should progress your knowledge of and skills in delivering global learning. A variety of CPD is on offer, ranging from external courses through training providers coming into your school to work directly with teachers, to online training. Your Expert Centre will help you to decide which CPD will best meet the needs of your school.

Is there a time limit on when the e-credits can be used?

The e-credit system has been designed to support Partner Schools in embedding global learning across the curriculum so schools are encouraged to undertake the professional development at the stage whilst they are working with their Expert Centres on their action plans, rather than when their formal involvement in the programme is at an end. Consequently, schools will have five terms from the date of their registration on the programme in which to redeem their e-credits.

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As a CPD provider, how do I go about getting a course approved as relevant to the GLP?

School CPD providers interested in having their courses and training approved by the GLP will firstly need to submit basic details about their course to the website. This information will be used to advertise courses on the CPD calendar.

Once this information has been submitted on the 'Become a provider form', you will be asked to complete the 'GLP CPD Criteria Form' with details about the content of your course or training and information about the trainers delivering it. This form is downloadable, and will need to be completed and returned by email. Once returned, the GLP will let providers know within three weeks if their course has been approved or not.

If a course is not approved providers have the option to work with the Institute of Education, University of London to make changes to their course. Or providers can make the changes themselves based on our feedback. Course can then be re-submitted for approval.
